CONSULTATION ON FREEPORT PLANNING APPLICATION

A planning application has been submitted by MAG to North West Leicestershire District Council detailing proposals for a site south of the A453 next to the airport. The planning application has now been registered by the Council and given the reference number 24/00727/OUTM.

A number of engagement sessions and meetings have been held with representatives from the closest village of Diseworth, including a site meeting in January and a public information event in June. The documents can be viewed on the

Council's website <u>here</u> and interested parties can submit any comments directly to the Council through the same webpage.

If approved, the development could result in more than 2,000 new jobs once fully operational and employ up to 174 people during a two-year construction period. It's estimated the new development could contribute up to £132m per year in GVA (Gross Value Added), to the East Midlands economy along with almost £9m in additional annual business rates contributions.

ENGAGING WITH THE AIRPORT THROUGH OUR CONSULTATIVE COMMITTEE

The East Midlands Airport Independent Consultative Committee (ICC) is the formal body in charge of liaison between the airport and our neighbouring communities.

All airports are required to have Airport Consultative Committees and the Department for Transport provides guidelines on how they should work. They are a well-established way in which airports can engage with key stakeholders in the local area and beyond.

The EMA ICC meets three times a year, and full details of these meetings including meeting dates, agendas, papers and minutes are published on our website here, where you can also find the Chair's 2023 Annual Review.

Membership of the East Midlands Airport ICC includes representatives from local authorities, airport user groups and local interest groups, and you can find the current list of ICC Members on the website here.

FANTASY WINGS PARTNERSHIP TAKES FLIGHT

Manchester Airports Group (MAG) recently announced a partnership with Fantasy Wings – a leading UK organisation dedicated to improving diversity in the aviation sector.

MAG is sponsoring 25 young people who are either women or from minority backgrounds and aged 13-25 and are interested in a career in aviation. They will join the year-long programme, designed to ensure young people entering the aviation workforce have the tools they need to succeed. INSPIRING THE NEXT GENERATION OF AVIATION PROFESSIONALS

We officially opened our new Aerozone and Academy premises in April, heralding a new era of insight into the aviation industry for local students, adult learners and jobs seekers.

The Aerozone, the airport's on-site education centre, provides an inspirational learning environment for children and young people aged 4 to 18 and is free for school and college visits. Students get to learn about the variety of roles at the airport and to experience, through hands-on activities, what it is like to work at an airport.

The Academy offers free adult training including a two-week course; 'Exploring the Aviation Industry'. It also offers tailor-made pre-employment and upskilling training, for around 200 unemployed or low-income

adult learners a year and for existing employees. The Academy course, now provided in partnership with Nottingham College, gives attendees a direct route for career or study progression within the aviation industry.

The occasion was marked with a special Aerozone visit by students from Farnborough Academy in Clifton, along with adult learners on a course. Visitors were greeted by our Managing Director Steve Griffiths and Lilian Greenwood, MP for Nottingham South. Past Academy learners who are now employed in Assisted Travel, Customer Services and Planning also joined the event. They gave inspiring talks, showcasing the impact of the Academy on their professional growth and personal development.

MAG MAKES STRIDES TOWARDS DECARBONISATION

As part of our commitment to airport operations being net zero carbon by 2038, we are making strides towards reducing emissions. In the last few months, we have:

- Established a strategic decarbonisation programme.
- Developed a science-aligned pathway to net zero scope 1 and 2 emissions by 2038.
- Identified several new electric vehicles to purchase this year at EMA.
- Reduced MAG's emissions through the purchase of green gas.

HOW WIND DIRECTION AFFECTS OUR OPERATIONS

Like all airports, East Midlands Airport operates according to the weather conditions, and wind direction plays a big role. To ensure a safe take-off and landing, aircraft fly into the wind.


Departing aircraft then follow flight paths known as Noise Preferential Routes (NPRs) until they reach a minimum altitude of 5,000ft. It is at this point that aircraft are released from the NPR and are vectored by NATS en-route. Our NPRs are designed to minimise the number of people impacted by aircraft noise by diverting aircraft away from some of the more built-up areas.

East Midlands Airport has one runway that can be operated in two directions, depending on the wind direction. The prevailing wind direction in the UK is westerly, which means that for around 75% of the time, at East Midlands Airport, Runway 27 is used. During westerly operations aircraft approach our airport from the east over East Leake, West Leake and Kegworth and depart to the west over Donington Park and then follow the NPRs either north or south over areas like Wilson and Swarkestone.

During periods of easterly winds (around 25% of the time), for safety reasons, the flight patterns are reversed, with aircraft using Runway 09. During easterly operations, aircraft depart to the east over Kegworth, and then follow the NPRs either north or south over areas like Thrumpton and Sutton Bonington. During easterly operations, aircraft arrive from the west over Melbourne.

Wind direction and speed is measured on the ground as well as at higher levels and conditions on the ground might not always be the same at higher levels. Aircraft start to establish their approach 3,000-4,000 ft above ground level, so the conditions above ground level may determine our operating mode.

Because we are dependent on weather conditions for the direction of operations, the proportion of easterly operations varies. We are aware that easterly operations disturb a greater number of people living near to the airport than westerly operations and so we operate in a westerly direction whenever it is safe to do so. The graph shows the split between westerly and easterly operations over the last five years.
